The children love to receive their Reading Rocket certificates as recognition for their reading at home.
- The children have enjoyed playing as a whole school at break times. With the Autumn outbreak of infections now contained, it was a pleasure to share with children that we no longer had to stay in bubbles.
- The current picnic tables have been given a fresh lick of paint over the holidays. The two benches are next to be tackled.

- Year 6 pupils will begin their SATs revision programme that next week. Parents will learn what the expectations are and how they can support their child at home.

General Reminders:

• Lunch boxes – Please can you ensure that your children's lunch boxes offer a healthy and balanced diet (think about the '5 a Day'). We are noticing an increased volume of chocolate and other items with a high proportion of sugar. NHS advice is to 'Switch the Sweets' – swap cakes, chocolate, cereal bars and biscuits for malt loaf, fruited tea cakes, fruit breads or fruit (fresh or dried).


Foxes Class

'What was your inspiration for the story?'

"Well, I really love animals and I know lots of children like animals. There's lots of normal animal books but I wanted to put a little twist on the animals and that's how Mixed Up Zoo came along with animals, that we recognise, all squished together."

"Did any author influence your style of writing?"

"Well I am a big fan of doctor Suez who wrote The Cat in the Hat and the Lorax so that's where I think the rhyming came from but obviously I think there is some comparison to Julia Donaldson as well. That's where I got the rhyming couplets from. I'm not sure that I necessarily copied her exactly but I think that's where I got the idea from."



"We thought the story had a moral do you agree?"

Yes, I think it has a moral. It's probably the first book I've written with a moral and yes I think we talked about it in assembly with everyone."

"What was the moral you intended to deliver?"



Well I think throughout the story, you've got the two character's: Squirrel who's

only interested in himself and he wants people to cheer for him and Qwabbit who's more interested in the world and other people. Hopefully the message that comes through is that it's good to it's good to look after other things and not just yourself.

"I am working on a new story. My next story and I'm giving you an exclusive on this one is Mixed Up Dinosaurs and Pandaguin and Kwabbit do come back into this text."

Which company did you publish with?

I published with Amazon because they were the cheapest one to go with and they can go straight on to the Amazon website.

What is your favourite character?

I like his personality. He's a little bit naughty as he writes on walls and he is full of character.

Summary of the new Covid-19 changes

- From 11 January, people who don't have Covid symptoms who receive a positive lateral flow test result will be required to self-isolate immediately and <u>won't be required to take a</u> <u>confirmatory PCR test</u>. This is a temporary measure.
- Anyone who has any one of the three Covid symptoms should self-isolate and book a PCR test
- The 10-day isolation period for someone (pupils and staff) with a positive result can be reduced to 7 days if they take 2 lateral flow tests on day 6 and 7 and both results are negative (tests must be taken 24 hours apart)
- People aged 18 years 6 months or over who are not fully vaccinated and are a household contact of someone with Covid are legally required to self-isolate.
- Household contacts aged under 18 years 6 months, those fully vaccinated and those not able to get
 vaccinated for medical reasons are not legally required to self-isolate, but are strongly advised to
 take lateral flow tests every day for 7 days. <u>See Stay at Home guidance</u>.
- The government has updated its <u>definition of critical workers and broadened the list of children</u> <u>considered vulnerable</u>

Where staffing is an issue, some schools are suggesting merging classes to maintain face to face provision. Our local education authority has asked schools to consider such action as part of our risk assessment.

A revised an updated risk assessment will be added to our website later this week.
